Sandia Heights' Crime Rate Compares Favorably With Two City Neighborhoods

The Sandia Heights community compared favorably with other neighborhoods in crimes per thousand population during 1990, according to statistics from the Albuquerque Police Department (APD) Crime Analysis Unit.

For purposes of comparison, the SHHA obtained and analyzed crime statistics from the APD for Sandia Heights and the areas covered by the Glenwood Hills Neighborhood Association and the

Four Hills Village Homeowners Association. Glenwood Hills and Four Hills were selected for their similarities with Sandia Heights in median income and geographic/topographic features and due to difficulties in finding another Bernalillo County neighborhood comparable to Sandia Heights.

Crimes per thousand population is determined by dividing a neighborhood's Crime Index by its estimated population.

The Crime Index is the sum total of all incidences of criminal activity within two broad categories -- violent crime and property crime.

In 1990, the Glenwood Hills area had two reported robberies (locations not listed on APD report); Sandia Heights had one reported robbery at the Circle K on Tramway Blvd. Total incidences of property crime - encompassing burglary, larceny, and auto theft - were 54 for Sandia Heights, 61 for Four Hills, and 124 for Glenwood Hills (see Table).

With an estimated population of 4,000, Sandia Heights had a 1990 crime rate of 13 crimes per 1,000 population; Four Hills had an estimated population of 3,000 and a crime rate of 20 crimes per 1,000 population; Glenwood Hills' estimated population was 2,250, making the 1990 crime rate 55 crimes per 1,000 population.

Security Patrol Offers Comprehensive Services

From handling burglaries and barking to snakes and solicitors, the Sandia Heights Security Patrol provides a unique blend of benefits and services to its subscribers.

Sandia Heights Security has been the official provider of security patrol services to residents and commercial enterprises in the Sandia Heights community since 1978.

The patrol has an 8-member staff, all of whom are state licensed, private patrol operators. The patrol is on duty 115 hours per week and is direct contact with the Bernalillo County Fire Department, Sheriff's Department, and local ambulance services. Continued on page 10

DEFINITIONS

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack of one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury, usually accompanied by the use of a weapon.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person by force or threat or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft.

<u>Larceny</u>: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession, or constructive possession, of another. It includes crimes such as thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc.

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Wanted: Neighborhood Watchdogs

The FBI Uniform Crime Reports has identified factors which have been determined to affect the volume and type of crime occurring from place to place. These factors include:

- Population density and degree of urbanization.
- Stability of population with respect to resident's mobility, community patterns, and transient factors.
- Modes of transportation and highway system.
- Economic conditions including median income and job availability.
- Cultural conditions such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Attitudes of citizenry toward crime.
- Crime reporting practices of the citizenry.

Sandia Heights is fortunate to have a number of these factors working in its favor to keep our community's crime rate at a minimum. Some factors are largely out of our control, while others can be positively impacted through support of the Sandia Heights Security Patrol and active involvement in crime prevention efforts.

Research on other neighborhoods' security efforts for this Crime Prevention issue has brought to light the obstacles other neighborhoods face in meeting their residents' security needs. One of the most active and successful communities within the City of Albuquerque in the area of neighborhood crime prevention is the Four Hills Village Homeowners Association. Dedicated Association members volunteer to become part of the neighborhood's security force which patrols each weekend on either Friday or Saturday night.

Richard McDowell, who currently is in charge of the volunteer patrol, says even though the patrol has proven to be a successful deterrent to crime in the area, it's getting harder and harder to recruit volunteers for patrol duty. Switching to a contract security service that can patrol more hours and offer more services seems to be somewhat inevitable in the near future.

The Glenwood Hills area has no official or organized security program. However, some 11 percent of the neighborhood's residences subscribe to the security patrol services of one particular contractor that specializes in providing security services to businesses and residential neighborhoods throughout the City.

In comparison, Sandia Heights is fortunate to have a professional, well-trained security patrol that offices on site and provides comprehensive services solely to our community. This beneficial arrangement is largely attributable to a wise decision by the SHHA Board of Directors back in 1978 to sanction and support the proposed establishment of the Sandia Heights Security Patrol in answer to the community's need to supplement services provided by the County Sheriff's Department. Since that time, the security patrol has been under the ownership and management of our community's developer, the Sandia Peak Tram Co. The favorable crime rate in our neighborhood is a tribute to the joint efforts of the Sheriff's office and the Sandia Heights Security Patrol.

Besides strengthening law enforcement and security efforts through support of the Sandia Heights Security Patrol and the County Sheriff's Department, we also must become a knowledgeable and active community of residents that refuses to accept crime as an inevitable "fact of life" or "sign of our times."

- Keep up the good work! The Sandia Heights community has maintained its strong participation and support of the recycling program despite continued problems with reaching Quail Run Center due to the Tramway Improvement Project. Recycling Saturdays for the next three months are November 23, December 28, and January 25. Bring your recyclables between 9 a.m. and 12 noon to the Quail Run Center, 12700 San Rafael.
- There will be no refuse collection on Thanksgiving Day (November 28), Christmas Day (December 25), and New Year's Day (January 1). Refuse will be picked up on the day following each holiday. A special pick up for Christmas trees will be made at no extra charge the week of January 6 through January 10, 1992. Residents are requested to place the trees out with their normal refuse on their scheduled collection day.
- The Albuquerque Academy has announced plans to develop the 1,000 acres located along the east side of Tramway Blvd., between Glenwood Hills and Sandia Heights. For purposes of developing this property, the Academy has formed the High Desert Investment Corporation, a wholly-owned taxable subsidiary of the Albuquerque Academy. High Desert has assembled a planning team comprising environmental consultants, land use planners, and engineers to assist in the planning and development process. High Desert has already announced that they will apply for annexation to the City of Albuquerque, with the first phase of construction to begin in 1994. The SHHA Board of Directors has been in contact with High Desert and will keep SHHA members informed regarding the proposed development plans as they become available for input.

Holiday Bazaar Cancelled Due To New County Rules

Implementation by Bernalillo County of new guidelines for fund raising activities at the County's fire stations resulted in the cancellation of the 1991 Sandia Heights Homeowners Association (SHHA) Holiday Bazaar.

According to the new rules, <u>all</u> proceeds from fund raising functions that take place at a Bernalillo County Fire Station must now be turned over to the County for disbursement. The new guidelines are the result of County Risk Management's concerns regarding liability.

The SHHA Holiday Bazaar was initiated a number of years ago to benefit participating Sandia Heights artists and the County District 5 Fire Station which serves Sandia Heights and North Albuquerque Acres. Artists gave ten percent of their total proceeds from the bazaar to the District 5 station, while the SHHA provided \$100 for advertising, publicity in the GRIT newsletter, and volunteers for planning, set-up, and hospitality.

The 1990 SHHA Holiday Bazaar raised \$476.76 for the District 5 Fire Station which went toward the purchase

of medical equipment for the paramedic unit.

"Bernalillo County gave short notice on this new policy, so there was no time to find and publicize an alternative location," said Rab Freeman, member of the SHHA Board of Directors and Co-Chair of the bazaar. "We hope the County will examine this new policy," said Lisa Stewart, SHHA Director and Bazaar Co-Chair, "and help us find a way to have the bazaar at our district fire station next year under conditions similar to past years."

"It's disappointing to the artists, crafts people, and volunteers to spend so much time and effort planning for this event, and then have it cancelled," Rab said. "A list of the artists who prepared items to sell at the bazaar is included in this issue of the GRIT (see page 4). Please look it over and then make arrangements to take a look at their work."

Riders Of The Purple . . . What?? Vol. I

When Zane Grey wrote "Riders of the Purple Sage", he formed an indelible (but blurry) image in American minds -limitless plains and deserts covered with sagebrush. He was a writer, not a botanist, and didn't really say what he meant by "sagebrush." To him sagebrush probably included all the shrubby desert plants: Artemisias, salvias, four-wind saltbush, rabbitbrush, winter fat, and black greasewood among others. This plant mix covers over 100,000,000 acres of the American West so he had plenty of room to roam.

Zane Grey's purple sage was probably the low, shrubby, evergreen gray ball salvia, Salvia dorrii, which is showy purple and beautiful in bloom. It is found in the western states from eastern Washington through Idaho and Utah to Arizona but isn't listed in the wild in New Mexico as far as I can find. During August and September, people refer to "purple sage" blooming along the highway near Belen and out on Highway 44 toward Zia, but they usually are talking

about that wonderful sand shrub, <u>Dalea scoparea</u>, which isn't a sage at all. Its small flowers are so numerous and such a brilliant purple that it makes a splendid show against the rosy sand. With the thinnest of leaves and twigs, it tends to fade into the background of our other grey shrubs during the rest of the year while it goes about the job of holding the sand in place.



In Utah, purple sage refers to bush mint, <u>Poliomintha incana</u> from the purple cast of the calyx, though its New Mexico version doesn't seem purple to me at all. Texans call the Texas silverleaf, <u>Leucophyllum frutescens</u>, "purple sage." Anyway, "purple sage" means different things to different people.

Too, the term sage has gotten well mixed up since it's used for <u>Artemisias</u> (members of the sunflower family), for

<u>Salvias</u>, bush mints and hedge nettles (all members of the mint family, look for the square stems).

The <u>Artemisias</u> are the plants we first think of when we say sages, meaning "sagebrush". Three are common in the wild in New Mexico: Big sagebrush, <u>Artemisia tridentata</u>; fringed sagebrush, <u>Artemisia frigida</u>; and sand sagebrush, <u>Artemisia filifolia</u>. There are a number of others, some of them quite small but all tough with aromatic leaves. The wild tarragon (<u>A. dracunculus</u>) is found in the Sandias and the Manzanos.

Both sand sagebrush and fringed sagebrush are very useful garden plants in our area. The sand sagebrush with its fine leaves carried on curving branches is extremely handsome. (Look for it all over the West Mesa and on the way to Alamogordo.) Fringed sagebrush grows all through the Sandia foothills. (Some sources say it is an indication of overgrazing.) It is ground hugging for most of the year, sending up silver bloom spikes in the summer. I also am fond of the grey-leafed Artemisia ludoviciana which needs a little more water than the extraordinarily drought-tolerant fringed sagebrush but rewards its owners with a larger plant and two-foot silver bloom spikes. Next time you need a tough, greyleafed plant for your garden, consider one of these Artemisias.

And you Zane Grey experts out there, tell me if you know for sure what Zane meant by "sage." It'd be fun to find out.



The Sandia Heights Security Patrol provides a comprehensive list of services to its subscribers and responds to a wide variety of needs and requests (see list of 1991 year-to-date patrol calls). Of particular value is the special patrol service provided (upon request) to a residence during the homeowner's absence. Proof of Sandia Heights Security's constant presence throughout the community is the patrol vehicle odometer which records an average of 4,000 to 5,000 patrol miles per month.

The security patrol also serves as a spotter and traffic controller for the County's District 5 Fire Department. In September, prompt radio notification of District 5 by a patrolling security officer who spotted smoke coming from a residence in Unit 18, accompanied by traffic control assistance through the Tramway Blvd. construction, helped to insure rapid response by fire fighters and minimized damage to the house.

To report a crime or crime-in-progress, residents should call the County Sheriff; the Sheriff's office automatically notifies the Sandia Heights Security Patrol of any crime problems within the community. Subscribers to the Security Patrol Service also can access the service directly via a mobile phone, message beeper, or the main office.

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
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State Redistricting Affects Sandia Heights

As we enter into the late fall/early winter months, I'd like to take this opportunity to update you on a few issues facing our District and your business. And, I appreciated the response, phone calls, and letters that were received after the last column. It is my obligation and promise to attend to your concerns, and your own participation, suggestions, and involvement are always welcome.

We finished redistricting in mid-September, a process mandated by the U.S. Government after the Census is completed every ten years. You will remain in U.S. Congressional District 1 and State Senate District 21. However, beginning in 1993, there is a change in your State Representative/House District. As the incumbent in District 31, I regret (from my view) that I will not be representing most of Sandia Heights.

Due to the large population increase since 1980, District 31 was cut by approximately 30%, and that included must of Sandia Heights and all the East Mountain Region (Tijeras, Cedar Crest, etc.). Those of you who live north of (approx.) San Bernadino will be in District 23, currently represented by Mark Caruso. And, many precinct numbers and boundaries have changed. You will be notified of those as well as the possible new voting locations as they become available.

The topic which sparked the most interest and outrage recently was the \$100 fee imposed by the N.M. Taxation and Revenue Department on Non-Taxable Transaction Certificates (NTTC's). This tax (let's call it what it is) is a "one-time" (supposedly) affair, and the NTTC registration is good for four years. The re-registration fee after four years will apparently not be imposed.

This is a particular burden on small businesses (which constitute most businesses in our State), and there will definitely be a bill introduced in the 1992 Legislative Session (in January) to try and repeal, change, or rebate this tax.

SHHA Seeks Land For County Park

The SHHA Board of Directors recently visited with representatives from Bernalillo County Parks & Recreation and County Commissioner Patricia Cassidy to explore the possibility of designating Sandia Heights Park as a County park in order to receive financial assistance with park maintenance.

The Homeowners Association's expenses for lease and maintenance of Sandia Heights Park are expected to exceed \$15,000 during the 1991-92 fiscal year. In addition, the demand for playing/practice fields in our community is so great that the needs can not be met by a single, private park.

Since the park is located on land belonging to the Sandia Pueblo (leased by the Sandia Peak Tram Co. and then subleased by the SHHA), the County attorney's office ruled as follows: "Bernalillo County has no legal power to pay for maintenance of a park that is not owned and dedicated for public use."

The SHHA Board will be pursuing with Pat Cassidy the acquisition of land for construction of a County park in our area. However since no County funds are available for acquisition of park land Northeast of I-25, benevolent persons/parties who wish to donate land for a park should contact Pat Cassidy (768-4217).

A special thanks goes out to Patricia Cassidy for her time and effort spent in assisting us in meeting our community's needs for parks and playing fields.

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Crime Prevention Tips From The Sandia Heights Security Patrol

Crime prevention actually is more important than crime fighting because it stops problems before they occur.

Get An Alarm System. Use It Faithfully. Alarm systems are a sound investment in crime prevention. If purchasing a system is simply out of the question, put stickers in every window saying you have an alarm and install a fake alarm box.

Form A Neighborhood Watch Program. Among the 30 subdivisions and 1600 residences in Sandia Heights, only one Neighborhood Watch program has been established. Studies have shown that Watch programs typically reduce residential burglaries, vandalism, and thefts from automobiles by 30% over a two-year period. Contact Ray Brads with the County Sheriff's office (768-4160) to find out more information about Neighborhood Watch.

Report Incidences Of Crime To County Sheriff And Security Patrol. Even though this may seem obvious, many seemingly minor crimes such as

vandalism or stolen car parts go unreported. When crimes aren't reported, the sheriff's deputies and security officers don't know they need to watch a particular area more closely.

Report Suspicious Vehicles/Persons/

Activities To Sheriff And Security Patrol. It's impossible to patrol every neighborhood, 24 hours a day. You can be the eyes and ears that help to protect our community.

Keep Your Garage Door Closed. Garage doors should be closed unless you are actually working in the garage or nearby. Many garage doors are left open while residents are out jogging or making a quick trip to the store. This invites theft.

Park Vehicles In Garages. Lock The Doors. The safest place to park vehicles overnight is in the garage. Vehicles parked in driveways or on the street should have the windows up and the doors locked.

Have A Happy Holiday Season. Don't leave presents in a car parked outside or in full view of any windows of your home.

<u>Use Timers When You're Out Of</u> <u>Town</u>. Put timers on house lights and a radio or TV. Use timers in rooms that are not easily seen if someone looks through a window.

<u>Install And Use Deadbolt Locks On</u>
<u>Exterior Doors</u>. A properly installed deadbolt and jam are great deterrents.

Notify The Security Patrol When You Leave Town. The patrol will pick up newspapers, watch for suspicious persons and vehicles, check to see if light timers are working, etc.

Tramway Project Phase II 40% Complete

I very much appreciate this opportunity to contribute to your publication. I hope that this brief update on the Tramway Project will be of interest to you. I look forward to sharing more information in upcoming issues of the GRIT about activities in your area and/or County government issues which may impact your neighborhoods.

The reconstruction of Tramway Blvd. from Montgomery to Paseo del Norte, begun last April, is now about 40 percent complete. The first phase of this work, consisting of paving and structures for half of the ultimate roadway width, is nearing completion and will be open to traffic by late November. At that time, access will be reopened at Manitoba and at Simms Park Rd., and obliteraiton of the old roadway will begin.

Also in mid-November, Academy Blvd. immediately west of Tramway Blvd. will be closed for not more than two weeks while the permanent Tramway/ Academy intersection is constructed. Traffic will be detoured during this period via Spain and Lowell. The media and the neighborhood associations will be advised when the exact closure date is known.

No other road closures are anticipated at this time, although there will be minor, short-term detours at various stages of work.

The overall schedule calls for completion of this new three-mile roadway by October, 1992. The final product will be a multi-lane, divided roadway similar to Tramway Blvd. south of Montgomery, with new bridge structures at the Bear and South Domingo Baca Arroyos.

- Study successful, proven crime prevention practices and techniques, and use that knowledge to help stop crime in our community (see Crime Prevention on page 13).

- Put an end to community complacency, and stop viewing crime as a problem only in "other people's neighborhoods."

- Learn from the successful proactive measures against crime utilized by other neighborhoods, like the Four Hills Village Homeowners Association which now offers a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons who commit crimes in their community.

- Reverse the trend toward neighbor anonymity. Take pride in knowing our neighbors' living patterns and looking after each other's welfare, safety, and security, while still respecting one

another's right to privacy.

With the development of Tramway Blvd. and the impending development of the Albuquerque Academy land immediately to the South, Sandia Heights is no longer that community "off the two-lane road, way out at the base of the mountain". We soon will be a County community immediately adjacent to the City of Albuquerque and confronting the prospect of possible City annexation.


