



Fine Tuning the Board for 1995-96

At the regular July meeting, the SHHA Board turned its attention toward improving its effectiveness. Initial steps were taken to retune policy, procedure and organizational approach for fiscal year 1995-1996.

While generally quite satisfied with the overall accomplishments of FY'94-'95, the Board hopes to improve its capabilities as a volunteer service group representing some 1800 households and an estimated 4000 residents.

The Board anticipates bringing the abundance of experience represented by the entire council into full play, making better use of its standing committees. To facilitate this direction, the organizational structure has been streamlined by combining several overlapping functions and redefining areas of committee responsibilities. The net result, approved by the full Board, is a reduction in committees from ten to seven. This action has eliminated some previous one and two person endeavors, and permitted the formation of larger groups with hopefully greater depth and flexibility. Time will tell.

In addition to the changes in structure, the Board elected officers and approved the chairpersons for '95-'96. The lineup is as follows:



Is Your Chamisa Blocking a View of the Road?

The Bernalillo County Department of Public Works has been receiving many complaints about overgrown chamisa that interferes with sight distance, causing a safety hazard. Rather than the County trimming the chamisa along your property line, they are giving residents the opportunity to cut their own chamisa away from the county right-of-way and have it picked up by a County crew.

The Department has scheduled August 19th for pickup of all trimmings from right-of-ways. (Note: Plant material from other areas of properties will not be taken.) If sufficient cutting is not done, the County will do additional trimming.

Pueblo Claim Persists

The Sandia Mountain Coalition is still awaiting word on dismissal of Sandia Pueblo's claim on 9,480 additional acres, most of which lie within the Sandia Mt. Wilderness Area and the Cibola National Forest. There is no way to anticipate when the decision will actually be made, but there have been additional developments.

Among the most important is the Bernalillo County Board of Commissioner's decision to intervene against the claim. The motion to intervene in the case as a defendant was based on the County's need to "protect its legal interests in the claim area," approximately half of which lies within the county.

The Board of Commissioners supports the Sandia Mountain Coalition efforts to provide access to these areas for all Bernalillo County citizens," said a Board spokesman. "We consider the National Forest and Wilderness Area to be Albuquerque's backyard and believe the public's access to the area needs to be preserved."

If the case is dismissed, the Pueblo will almost certainly step up its pressure on Secretary Bruce Babbitt and the New Mexico Congressional Delegation.

A lobbying effort headed by an Arizona lobbyist, former US Senator Dennis DeConcini is already being directed at President Clinton in a direct effort to seize ownership of the land; or have it put "in trust" as a transition to Pueblo ownership, with the Pueblo's demands first and foremost.

The government filed its motion to dismiss on March 24, 1995 and a reply to Sandia Pueblo on May 23rd. In the ensuing paperwork, the government has restated its original position that the claim

is invalid and that the Pueblo did not make use of any of the available channels for resolution of its dispute even as late as 1978, when the Wilderness Area was first created. It is also the government's position that the Pueblo's "erroneous survey" ploy was an end-around the Quiet Title Act.

If the case is not dismissed, Sandia Mountain Coalition intervention will then be determined.

Now, however, there are new developments on the table, based on a closer look at documents that have previously formed the "basis" of the Pueblo's claim. Research at the New Mexico Historical Archives have turned up questionable boundary calls and clearly altered documents. This research and the tampering with documents has already been confirmed by a New Mexico State historian.

Locating it with our command center guarantees the station will be staffed around the clock, seven days a week. We worked very hard to encourage this use in District IV and believe our community will be well served. As the other uses for the center are finalized, I'll keep you informed. We are hearing some exciting possibilities.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING SATURDAY ~ JUNE 3, 1995

I. Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by President Richard Krumbein at 10:20AM.

A. Commissioner Barbara Seward: The Commissioner praised SHHA's use of Committee structure. She is working to mitigate the overhead lighting South of Paseo del Norte (PDN). Recycling has returned in the past year. An Alameda Corridor Study has begun. The County has pledged dollars for the legal battle with Sandia Pueblo and continued access of Sandia Mountain. The sheriff's substation, with Senator Tom Wray's assistance in state fund finding, may include a communication unit.

B. Sheriff Joe Bowditch: New substation will be at Holly and Eubank on donated land with \$500,000 in bonds available for building. It will have a community room, crime lab, and traffic day coverage, with a 24-hour coverage ASAP. A training unit is not part of the program at this time. Construction to be completed by September 1996. Sven Gilbert, architect. Response time is expected to improve. Noise, decibels unspecified, is legal from 7AM - 10PM daily. An ordinance, with method of measurement included, needs to exist to address overly loud sounds.

The County is considering placing the new communications unit, complete with Computer Aided Dispatch System (CADS) here on a second floor, Nat Arrieta, Communications Manager, assisted the Sheriff in answering questions. Bob Kambie MOVED that the SHHA, at this general meeting on June 3, 1995, endorse the location of the Communication system as part of the Sheriff's Command Center as described today by Sheriff Bowditch.

2ND - J. Brink, MOTION was unanimously passed by the Board and neighbors present.

Martine Garcia: Speed studies of our neighborhood show a 41 MPH average. The County has been hesitant to use speed humps due to legal ramifications. Sandia Heights has been approved for 2 Humps (one on Trarmway Lane and the other on San Rafael or Live Oak) for test. After 60 days of being in place, the County will remove them if the ramifications/benefits balance, to add more prior stop signs and mid-block points. Humps are 4" high, 12' long and painted white on the approach side.

County rubber asphalt for a natural based foot path (stroller accessible) throughout some of the neighbor hoods might be funded by the state. Sealing of roads and asphalt curbs is in process. Anthony Vigil asks residents to call 848-1503 for road problems and 848-1504 for signage problems.

Tim for signs on right-of-way by homeowners will be announced in the August GRT. A County crew will pick up trimmings from right-of-way only, not whole property. Crew will do any not done by owners after this date. Live Oak speed is now changed to 25MPH. Safe MPH for a road is determined by sight distance (pedestrian traffic especially considered); spot-speed study; and Ball Bank indicator. The speed check program: Week 1 = see speed on roadside monitor, Week 2 = see ticket.

An Ordinance for appropriate barricade and quality repair by contractors will come before the Commission June 20, 1995. This ordinance will also permit Block Parties.

Discussion for over lighting will be Wednesday, June 7, 6PM, at San Rafael & Trarmway Blvd, parking lot Carol Dumont. Simms Park Trail is a result of High Desert grant giving right-of-way and funding (must be completed by Spring 1996 to keep money). The Trail will use the 16" directly south of Simms Road's 50' right-of-way. It will be dirt and appropriate for Pedestrian and Equestrian use. A feasibility study for a bike path along Simms Road is in process, but there is no money to fund the path now. A point where Open Spaces begins, a post and stretched, smooth wire fence will be placed by National Forest along the property line.

Ms. Dumont encouraged us to use the Trailwatch program and disseminated their pocket cards on Trail Etiquette.

Carlos Padilla on PDN: Avid Engineering is doing Paseo del Norte from Wyoming to Trarmway Blvd, Eubank will be dividing point for Phases 1 & 2. City will complete 1-25 to Wyoming, 50% of gaining right-of-way from East end is completed. Construction starts in 2-3 years. Anthony Vigil informed us that Left Turn Bays will be added to PDN beginning in September, 1995.

Limited truck usage is permitted West of 2nd St. No restrictions exist for I-25 and East. Senator Tom Wray suggested Wyoming to Trarmway be a restricted use area. He will work on this. The Commission's goal has been to get the job done and restrict the use as a bypass.

Carlos Padilla on Alameda Corridor Study as prescribed by the 1977 Master Plan. The study assesses the necessity for a 4-lane road use, trail and alignment needs. Next public meeting in July.

III. Introduction of Current Directors: President Krumbein extended special thanks to resigned Board members, Robin Dotz-Olsen, Ben Fealock, Doug Mielson and Arlene Riddford.

M. President's Report: Pres. Krumbein reports that the function of the Board has been to respond to covenant violations and will continue to be so. He described letters warning the homeowner and legal action taken when mitigation has not occurred. It has been tested in court: the Association and private individuals suits have been upheld. Treasurer's Report: Disbursed: \$71,200. Received: \$69,500. Cash-On-Hand: \$17,060. We are above budget due to covenant and architectural legal expenses, more mailings to members and change of Administrative Assistant. There will be a study for a possible raising of dues. Architectural Review costs are part of the covenants and can not be raised without a 75% voter response. Profit shown in Community Services is the result of Barbara Bensonhaver's organization of our social activities, most remarkably the Wine Tasting at \$8.00/person.

A View from the Ranger's Station

Summer is finally upon us after a late start this June. We are still behind in moisture although our incidence of fires has only been moderate this year.

Mountain Discovery Days will be

history by the time you receive this article. I hope you had a chance to participate in this

fun and informative weekend of activities about the natural and cultural management

of mountain ecosystems across New Mexico. It is one of the only events to single out environmental education about mountain systems

in the state and is supported by a multi-agency host of partners and private sponsors.

Several important events continue to hold our attention. Let me share a couple of

them with you. First, the Pueblo de Sandia continues to pursue analysis of litigation and/or political avenues to have a correction

made to their Pueblo Grant of 1748, which was formalized by a U.S. grant from President Lincoln in 1864. The Forest Service recognizes and actively supports Native American religious, traditional, cultural activities on all National Forest. By law and direction, the Forest Service considers all stakeholder's interests in its efforts to balance uses of the land within the correct context of desired conditions for the earth's ecosystems. The laws regarding American Indian uses reserves a special responsibility to see that traditional practices essential to maintaining viable cultural institutions are allowed to continue unimpeded.

The issue of whether an error in the patent was made in the 1864 grant is for the courts to resolve. At this point the analyses conducted of the relevant facts and law relating to the claim by the Dept. of Agriculture, Forest Service indicate that the claim is not valid. The Forest Service will continue to see that all information and facts are revealed for a fair and open resolution of this question. Should political avenues be pursued, the Forest Service encourages all stakeholders and users of the Sandia Mountains to voice their opinions on their rights to use of the Mountain to their respective elected representatives. In the interim, our local office will continue to work cooperatively with the Pueblo de Sandia in addressing their religious and ceremonial uses of the Mountain.

All citizens should realize that they have a vested interest in their National Forest

and should work cooperatively to see that equal access and use of this important open space resource is preserved for all cultural needs and activities. That may mean some restrictions on timing and location of activities to meet the critical needs of either cultural traditions or vital species habitat. It is all part of sharing a finite resource.

Second, the Forest Service has submitted a proposal in upcoming legislation for direct fee collection by the agency of use of Developed Recreation sites along the State Road 165 (Las Huertas Canyon). The first phase of the proposal is similar to the concession study we approved for 1996 season, except that the local Forest Service unit would receive 80% of the collections and the other 20% would be for agency overhead costs. This would provide a substantial source of funds for the Sandia Ranger District to administer and expand quality services at these sites and maintain enhanced law enforcement patrols of these areas. We are holding the concession prospectus in pending status until early October, when we expect to hear word on the final passage of legislation and signature by the President. The proposal calls for full user fee implementation for all sites on Sandia Mountain by 1998.

The final phase will require further agreements and negotiations with the State Highway Dept., Pueblo de Sandia, Albuquerque Open Space and others. I believe we are entering an era in which user fees will be a viable tool to offer quality outdoor recreation services. If a majority of the fees stay with the local management unit providing that service, user fees will also be an important source of funding to implement capacity management of the Mountain.

I'd like to thank our hard working staff and also the many volunteers who daily provide vital services in visitor contacts, wilderness patrols, trail maintenance and a host of other jobs. We have over 100 people on a regular basis helping to give something back to their National Forest.



Plague Found in Far NE Heights

City health officials confirmed plague in a wood rat found dead in North Albuquerque Acres this summer. Residents on both east and west sides of Sandia Mountain should avoid dead or dying rodents and not allow their dogs and cats to roam freely as they may encounter infected animals and bring them back home.

If you encounter dead rodents, contact the environmental health department at 768-2600 to have them picked up and tested for plague infection.

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1995 has been a good year for the Association. Through our membership drives, membership in the Association increased substantially. However, thirty percent of the Sandia Heights residents are still not members of the Association. Through the SHHA's efforts and invaluable assistance from our legislators, Tom Vray and Kip Nacey, the New Mexico Legislature appropriated additional funds to build and operate a new Sheriff Substation in our area. We have made inroads in our efforts to keep the Park for the enjoyment of the residents. This issue is not yet resolved, primarily because of the renewed attempts by the Sandia Pueblo to claim rights to almost 10,000 acres of open space, including part of the western side of the Sandia Mountain, Cibola National Forest, Juan Tabo and La Cueva picnic area, La Luz and Piedra Lisa Trails, and areas of Sandia Heights North.

The Association has taken an aggressive role in Covenant Enforcement. Various lawsuits for enforcement of covenants have been filed, and an injunction stopping construction in violation of covenants was issued by a District Court. Enforcement of the Restrictive Covenants remains the primary responsibility of the SHHA, and we will continue our efforts to ensure that our community does not deteriorate.

It has been a privilege to serve as your president. Thank you for your support and for giving me the opportunity to serve the community.


For fiscal year 1994-95, both revenues and expenditures exceeded the budget; fortunately by approximately the same amount. So CASH ON HAND projections were close to accurate. The largest contributor to increased revenues was dues payments, which increased because of growth and membership. Communications expenditures, which include Association publications, Administrative Assistant's time and other costs associated with keeping SHHA members informed, were greater than anticipated. Expenses to support the Sandia Heights Park were less than budgeted because of closure due to the construction of the new water tank. Community Services expenditures were reduced due to donation of food for the annual Spring Picnic. Indirect administration costs increased due to higher supply and postage costs, as well as purchase of equipment and transition to new staff.

COVENANT SUPPORT


JIM NACHBAR - CHAIR



Mile High Cooking Can Effect Your Favorite Recipes

By Patricia Aaron - Home Economist, NMU Cooperative Extension Service

Cooking a mile high here in

Albuquerque is a way of life. For new-

when your family's favorite cake falls,

the potatoes are crunchy or your coffee

is weak. If you know what to expect

when cooking at this altitude, these sur-

prises can be controlled or eliminated.

Problems of altitude cooking are

of two classes - boiling and leavening.

As elevation increases, atmospheric

pressure decreases and so does humid-

ity. This causes the rate of evapora-

tion of liquids to increase. Water will boil

at 212 degrees at sea level and at 203

degrees at 5000 ft. here in Albuquerque.

No matter how high you turn the heat,

water will not exceed the temperature of

the boiling point at this elevation. Nor

will foods in the water get any hotter

than the water. So expect foods cooked

in water to take longer.

Coffee - When brewing coffee, a

longer brewing time is needed to com-

pensate for the lower water temperature.

You may need to set your automatic cof-

fee maker on medium-strong or strong

instead of medium.

Breads - Yeast breads rise faster

at high elevations. Proofing time is just

as important as the elevation as it is at

sea level. You may need to punch down

the dough several times, until the sug-

In rich cakes, it is sometimes neces-

sary to reduce shortening by 1 to 2 Tbs.

per cup. Fat, like sugar, weakens cell

structure. Also an increased amount of

egg strengthens the cell structure and may

keep a high-fat cake

from falling.

The leavening

gas for angel food and

sponge cakes is mostly

air, which expands

faster at high elevations.

Whip the egg whites

only until they form soft

peaks that will still fall

over. You can strengthen the cell structure

by using a few tablespoons more flour.

Bake 10 to 15 degrees higher.

Cookies - Most cookie recipes

will produce acceptable results at high

altitudes, although a slight reduction of

leavening and sugar is recommended.

Measure the dry ingredients accurately

and do not overbake the cookies. If the

dough seems a little dry, try adding a

small amount of liquid.

Pie Crust - Pie crust is not affected

by altitude as it bakes. However, you may

need to add slightly more liquid to dough

and use as little flour as possible when

rolling it out.

Definite rules cannot be strictly

applied in all recipe adjustments because

of the varying proportions of ingredients

in different recipes. Each recipe needs to

be tested individually.



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

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"Problem Bears" Can Start with People Problems

Hi there! Anything to declare... like food?

In my travels throughout New Mexico I encounter lots of people with lots of questions. They range from the basic to the bizarre, but by far the most frequently asked questions involve bears. People are curious to know more about these fascinating creatures and their sometimes frequent sightings in our towns and cities.

So far this spring, sightings have been reported in Springer, Raton, Ruidoso, Las Vegas, Santa Fe and Las Cruces. That's right...there was a bear encounter in Las Cruces. It might not surprise many people to see bears in the smaller mountain towns, but if you have ever been to Las Cruces, you know that it is neither small nor mountainous. In many areas of New Mexico, summer cabins and even some small towns are located in bear habitat.

Encounters between bears and people occur in the summer and fall months. During this time, black bears are trying to fatten up for the winter hibernation, and may be actively feeding for up to 20 hours a day, ingesting close to

20,000 calories daily. Drought conditions since the fall of 1988 have resulted in poor natural forage in some areas; recent rains have created temporary grass to eat, but berries and acorns may be in short supply. Thus, bears may be drawn to human-generated food supplies.

When bears do come into human inhabited areas, people often want the Department of Game & Fish to trap and relocate these "problem bears." Trapping is not necessarily the best solution, because bears often come back to the same location from which they were trapped, or get into territorial fights where they are released and may be killed by other bears. What then should be done to handle these situations? The answer: Avoid creating the problem in the first place.

If a bear is hungry and can smell food, it is capable of getting into most anything. But black bears, the one bear species found in New Mexico, are very seldom the culprits when it comes to human interactions. Normally, it is "problem people" not "problem bears" that instigate most encounters.






EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The last year has seen your Executive Committee hard at work on a number of issues, events and administrative details. A Board Training was held in August of 1994 for the newly elected members. ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW

TONI SEIDEL – CHAIR

The past year has been as busy as ever for the ARC. While the number of lots left in Sandia Heights are few, each one presents a special set of challenges. The ARC has discovered the utmost diligence is required to keep current with each new project and any possible problems. The characteristics that make Sandia Heights unique also make construction here quite challenging. The goal of the ARC has been to preserve the uniqueness of our neighborhood.

The committee realized that the best way to accomplish our goal was to have a clear set of guidelines and procedures for everyone to follow. Since each unit in Sandia Heights has its own set of covenants, we have to consider each project on its own merits. However, we can have an established set of guidelines for everyone to follow. By consistently following these procedures while realizing each project has its own problems, no one is given special treatment, yet everyone has the opportunity for a unique solution. What makes our area special is a sense of community made up of individuals who have respect for the whole. I can't think of another community in Albuquerque that governs itself in this unique way.

Another goal set by the committee was improved communication with county building officials to ensure thoughtful development in our area. Great strides have been made in this regard. We now have a cooperative relationship that allows both the ARC and the county to do their jobs better. Both parties realize it can be a mutually beneficial relationship.

The ARC anticipates another busy year ahead, but it should be a productive one. We hope our efforts will continue to have positive results.

COMMUNICATIONS

Four regular issues of The Grit were published during the fiscal year ending June 1995, including the FALL, WINTER, SPRING and SUMMER issues. In addition, a special issue of The Grit was published in July addressing the Sandia Heights Park closure.

The 1995 Directory was published and distributed during January - February of this year.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

BARBARA BENSONHAVER – CHAIR

This was a very successful year for activities run by Community Services.

The first major event was the October Arts and Crafts Sale held at Sandia Heights Academy for the second year. The participants enjoyed the friendly, well lit atmosphere the preschool offered. I would like to thank the Academy for opening their facility to us at no charge. They are certainly great neighbors! Although there were fewer artisans this year, the total sales were about the same as past years, with people coming from all over Albuquerque. The proceeds will go to refurbish or replace the Sandia Heights signs. I recommend that the event continue to occur in October, even though Balloon Fiesta and other major and minor shows are going on at the same time. It is withstanding the competition and it pre-empt the numerous holiday craft shows.

The First Annual Wine Tasting was held in March of '95 at Futures for Children Indian School. About 125 people attended for a nominal fee and were very pleased with the broad and varied wine selections made by National Distributing. Their knowledgeable staff served and explained the wines to everyone's enjoyment. Attendees brought their favorite appetizers and volunteers from the school gave tours of the facility. They also offered a small Native American art sale/show. I'd like to thank National Distributing for making this a low-cost, fun-filled evening.

The final event was our annual SHHA Spring Fling Picnic. Due to the construction at the Juniper Hill park, the location was changed to Kwanis picnic grounds at Elena Gallegos open space, and the date changed to a Sunday. The total attendance of 250 surpassed previous years. Once again Circle K provided the cooking and food. Senator Tom Wray was responsible for accompaniments and prizes for children. The sheltered space offered far more shade and table seating than ever before and was definitely appreciated.

Games were held in the volleyball area. We were able to award 18 door prizes, thanks to Rowlands, County Line Restaurant, Tram Company, Yogi's Frozen Treats, Outpost, Double Rainbow Restaurant, Page One Bookstore, Sandia Shadows Winery, Beauti Control, Flowerage, Subway and Pizza Hut.

Parking was the biggest problem, since it was available on a limited basis and the small lot filled quickly. Rangers were concerned about those parking illegally and the admission charge for non-members, which in their view was solicitation. If we use this park again, we need to reconsider how we collect any fees. I suggest the Board take a more active role in running the event with individuals responsible for specified tasks. It might be wise to assign a committee to the event to ensure that logistics are shared by an informed group. I recommend using this location again since it is larger and more interesting as long as problems can be addressed.

Neighborhood coffees continued each month throughout Sandia Heights. Many people think of attending only if it is in their immediate locale. More encouragement and/or welcome is needed to change this perception.

Sandia Heights once again participated in the Eisenhower Middle School Collaborative Committee. This year we were represented by Pam Langheim. It is important for our neighborhood to be involved in this effort, which provides after-school activities for students. We will be needing a representative for the coming year.

I enjoyed the three years I spent on the Board and especially being in charge of this committee. It is instrumental in bringing the growing population of Sandia Heights together as a community. I hope my successor will continue the on-going functions and be able to expand them for the benefit of all. I wish to thank the Board for their support and especially for nominating me for "Sandia Heights Outstanding Individual of the Year" at this year's NeighborFest.







This last year to help guide our own efforts and to provide meaningful recommendations to the county commissioner and state legislators, we identified early on a list of "new development priorities" for 1994-95. Those included, among others:

One might presume that with Sandia Heights nearly "filled out" with homes, the SHHA activities regarding "new develop- ment" would begin to see a decrease. Such proves not the case. In fact, the actions of the New Development Committee (and its consequent interactions with residents, with governmental agencies and with neighboring homeowners associa- tions) has seen a steady increase over the past two years. Those have generally taken the form of pursuing SHHA established goals and reacting to new situations.

GOVERNMENT LIAISON

SENATOR TOM WRAY & BOB KEMBLE – CO CHAIRS

Local Law Enforcement Presence Comes Closer to Reality.

With the past session of the state legislature, Bernalillo County received a \$200,000 appropriation for proposed Sheriff's Command Center. This appropriation was in addition to \$350,000 for Command Center arising from the 1994 legislative session. The joint assistance of state Representatives Kip Nicely and Frank Bird, and County Commissioner Barbara Seward, was invaluable during the past two years to obtain funding sufficient to place this important anti-crime measure in our neighborhood. With the new Command Center location near the Domingo Baca Dam, we are hopeful that a 24-hour police presence can be maintained, greatly reducing response times on calls from citizens in the community.

Legislative Funding for Other Community Needs.

Also coming out of the last session, both the Roadrunner and Altamont Little Leagues received funding to improve the field sites: \$150,000 and \$100,000, respectively. Funds in the amount of \$350,000 were appropriated for a new public library near the Harper/Barstow area, while paving and road improvement projects on Del Rey NE and the roads in North Albuquerque Acres were authorized.

Sandia Pueblo's Land Claims to Sandia Peak.

The Sandia Heights Board of Directors unanimously passed a resolution on January 11, 1995, supporting the efforts of the Sandia Mountain Coalition to protect and defend the rights of use of open space that would be comprised if the Pueblo's claim was perfected. This Committee will continue to monitor this development and the impact it would have on private property rights in the Sandia Heights' area, with particular emphasis on communicating our concerns to Senator Pete Domenici and Congressman Steve Schiff. We are hopeful that dismissal of the Pueblo's lawsuit in US District Court will settle this issue permanently.

SHHA Continues Negotiation of New Agreements with Sandia-Peak Utility Company and Sandia Properties, Ltd.

As of this writing, negotiations were nearing completion on three agreements between the SHHA Board of Directors and two Sandia Peak Companies. One agreement, the Joint use Park Agreement, will govern the terms of use and maintenance of the Sandia Heights Park. The Park Improvement Agreement sets forth the responsibilities of Sandia Properties regarding placement of improvements at the Park, and the installment payments by the SHHA to Sandia Properties for such improvements. The Services Agreement between SHHA and Sandia Properties provides for association dues billings and certain mail notification procedures by the Sandia Peak Utility Company on behalf of SHHA, as well as the responsibility for covenant enforcement by SHHA. These agreements will require ratification by the SHHA Board prior to execution. Negotiating on behalf of the Board are Toni Seidel, Anne Yegge and Tom Wray.

Future Matters of Interest.

This Committee will continue to follow developments associated with the acquisition of additional rights-of-way for the expansion of Paseo del Norte, as well as the Alameda Corridor Study. The installation and final location of the proposed county day-use soccer fields will also be monitored closely through the office of Commissioner Seward. The continued issuance of citations for heavy truck traffic over Tramway Boulevard will remain a priority, as well. Any SHHA member wishing to provide input to this important liaison activity should feel free to contact any SHHA Boardmember.

MEMBERSHIP

MICHAEL GROSS – CHAIR

Unlike many homeowners associations, membership in the Sandia Heights Homeowners Association is purely voluntary. At the end of 1994, approximately sixty percent (60%) of property owners in Sandia Heights were dues paying members of the association. Forty percent (40%) of the property owners did not pay dues or otherwise participate in association activities. As a result of this limited membership, the association has been limited in its financial resources and unable to complete many of its well-intentioned projects. Consequently, a new membership drive was initiated in January 1995.

The drive consisted of a commitment by each association board member to call twenty prospective members with a goal of contacting five hundred property owners. Additionally, letters were sent to the five hundred potential members. Board members spent a total of approximately two hundred (200) hours making calls and soliciting membership.

As a result of these efforts, one hundred twenty (120) new members joined the association. The membership has been increased by ten percent (10%), and the association now has an overall membership of seventy percent (70%) of the property owners in Sandia Heights. The cost of the campaign was \$500 but the potential annual dues has now increased by \$5000.

This increase in membership is significant and should make the association much more viable. We expect to launch a new campaign in 1996 so we can continue to grow the association and improve service to the community.

ROAD & SAFETY SUB-COMMITTEE

JANE GOINS – CHAIR

The first meeting of the new road-safety committee came about as a result of neighborhood concern for speed, chamisa overgrowth and road markings (center yellow lines, etc.). Concerned neighbors that had been calling were approached to join the newly formed committee, along with some SHHA Board members. That first meeting, held on February 28, 1995, was attended by Jane Goins and Arlene Riddiford of the SHHA Board, Bob Craemer of the neighborhood association, Martin Garcia, Traffic Control Manager for the County of Bernalillo and Bob Fogelson, a county engineer.

The committee has been successful in getting the county to be aware of our concerns. At this time they are working on changing the posted speed on Cedar Hill, Live Oak and San Rafael to 25 mph. They are working on a design for some speed humps for Sandia Heights and the Sheriff Department is trying to be more visible. Some places where chamisa overgrowth is a problem are also being trimmed.

We meet regularly and discuss various safety concerns in our neighborhood. The county has been very open to our ideas and concerns and wants more input. At various meetings we have had other neighborhood members attend, such as John Matthews. And also the County Sheriff Department has had Sgt. Darryl Smith and Sgt. Dave Frazzee.
