J: So, when did you move to the neighborhood?

K: It was 7 years in September I believe, or October.

J: And what brought you here?

K: We have family living up the road. My husband's daughter and our two grandchildren. They live also in the Sandia Heights but further down.

J: Do you like it? Do you like the neighborhood, the city?

K: Oh yes. We've lived here previously. Twenty-some years ago we lived in Albuquerque. We moved and then once my husband retired, we moved back here from Colorado. The first time, we didn't live in this neighborhood; we lived a little further up the road off Tramway. And then when we moved back here, we thought that Sandia Heights would be a nice place to have a permanent home, no more moving.

J: What's your favorite part of living here?

K: I love the mountain view. I love the mountains and I

love the foothills. Also, the neighborhood is an older neighborhood, where we live. The houses are smaller. It's just my husband and I, so we were looking for a smaller home, and the neighborhood we moved to was just perfect for that.

J: How long have you been interested in photography?

K: Many, many years ago when we still were using film, I actually started doing black & white photography, even developed my own photos. That was probably 30 years ago. I kind of got away from it. A little bit before we moved here, I started getting a new interest in photography. About 8 years ago I started with digital photography. Usually my favorites are animals and birds and a little bit of landscapes. Every now and then I do family photography, like portraits, but not very often. It's not my favorite thing to do.

J: Have you been published anywhere?

K: No. I post my photos on Flickr.

J: Do you do any other visual arts? Painting, drawing?

K: I just started drawing a little bit last year, but nothing spectacular. I try, but it's...it's much harder than photography. I thought it would be cool to do some pencil drawings, and looked up some stuff on YouTube. I copied; I followed step by step along, and it looked pretty ok. But without guidance I can't do it. Not yet, at least.

I concluded the interview by asking what brought her inspiration and joy. She answered "Photography and nature, animals and birds. I read a lot, and that's about it." She then paused and thought for a second before adding, "Oh, and my husband of course," which made us both chuckle.


Name That Hewn Sculpture Stan Davis



The Sandias are known for great granite sculptures all hewn by Mother Nature. Many of the gigantic ones are famous among climbers and have names such as The Shield, The Needle, The Thumb, and the Jawbone.

Have you ever ridden the tram? If so, the tram attendant may have pointed out some smaller—though still massive by human scale—sculptures, such as the colloquially named *Cannon* and *Golf Ball*. Higher up, you may have also seen the infamous and appropriately named *Dragon's Tooth* from the tram vantage (see H. Prather, *The GRIT*, Nov. 2020).

If you've hiked around the foothills and Open Spaces, you may have seen granite shapes that evoke a familiar object of some sort to you. The attached figure shows some of my favorites, some of which have been unofficially nicknamed by hikers and geocachers, who love to dub such things. 

Discounted Tram Passes — An SHHA Member Perk! Elizabeth Edgren, Chair Community Service and Membership Committee

The SHHA purchases Tram passes in a corporate package once a year from the Sandia Peak Tram company, which sets the prices for these discounted passes. Our package includes eight passes per open day for each month of the coming year. SHHA pays for the year's passes up front. Any passes the office does not sell to us members for a particular month cannot be used in a later month, so the SHHA loses money for any passes we members don't buy.

You may buy up to eight passes for any one date, depending on availability. Plan ahead! The office can process credit or debit card payments as well as personal checks. NO cash. Passes are currently \$10 but will increase sometime in 2025; details are as yet unknown.

How to enjoy a great discounted pass experience:

(1) Plan ahead! Check our SHHA website to see how many passes are available for the day you want at <u>Tram</u> <u>Pass Availability | Sandia Heights Homeowners Association (sandiahomeowners.org)</u>.

(2) Go to the SHHA office and purchase—with debit or credit card or personal check, but NO cash—up to eight passes for any **one** date in the month, depending on availability.

(3) The office staff will verify that you are dues-paying members of the SHHA, then print out "authorization letters" for your group.

(4) On your chosen day, give the authorization letter(s) to the cashier at the Tram station, and they will give you your actual tickets.

NOTES:

- You cannot reserve or pay for passes over the phone or by email.
- If the Tram is closed on your chosen day, the Tram cashier will stamp your authorization letter, giving you 30 days in which you can use the passes.
- Remember, children under five ride FREE and don't need a pass!

The Artist Next Door Claudia Mitchell

I thought the start of the new year would be a good time to introduce myself, **Claudia Mitchell**, the author of "The Artist Next Door" series and Sandia Heights Artists member. I may as well confess right away: I am a perpetual student of oil painting—and I love what I do!

I have always been interested in artsy things. My mother was a self-taught artist with a good eye and innate talent for sketching and painting. I loved to see the brushes and paints on the corner table where she made a place to work. When I started grade school—waa-aay back when— art was a part of the curriculum in my public school. We joyously and unselfconsciously painted with tempera using big brushes on BIG sheets of paper clipped to an easel. In first grade, I was awarded a firstplace blue ribbon for a painting of birds in a city-wide school exhibit. I often wish I still had that painting to feel a bit better—or worse—about some of my work today!

However, visual art took a backseat as I studied hard in school, and pursued my other artsy interest, vocal music. Earning gold medals for solos at state competitions in high school and singing the lead roles in "HMS Pinafore" and "Amahl and the Night Visitors" in college led to a USO tour performing solo and with a group. This musical jaunt in 1969 at the height of the Vietnam war included military hospitals and bases in Korea, Japan, the Philippines, Okinawa and Guam. It was a heady experience for a twenty-year-old!

I finished college with a bachelor's degree in biology from the University of California, Riverside graduating cum laude and earning entry into Phi Beta Kappa. Art of any kind got kicked to the side and stayed there as I pursued my profession as a registered medical technologist running a hospital lab followed by a career in medical diagnostics sales.

Retirement in 2015 to Whidbey Island, Washington found me back into vocal music performance. But, at the urging of a friend, I began a course of atelier-style study of classic representational oil painting at Whidbey Island Fine Art Studio. I worked diligently for three years. In 2020 I began showing my work at a local studio on the island in Langley. Looking for a complete change of scene and sunshine, my partner and I made a scouting trip to Albuquerque in December 2021. We were thrilled to find our current home here in Sandia Heights and moved in January 2022. We saw signs about the artists 2022 tour and visited every stop. We joined the group and have been a host stop for the past two years.

In writing this series, I have asked many artists what inspired them to work in their medium or media. They all stop and ponder. Inevitably, it boils down to an inexplicable love of a particular form of artistic expression, perhaps influenced by life experience. I am no exception. I love the smell and feel of the paints and brushes, remembering my mother's paintings. I love how the paint changes as it dries and cures. Every painting is a challenge and experiment. Edgar Degas is credited with saying, "Painting is easy when you don't know how, but very difficult when you do." So true. The more I learn as I study painting, the more I realize how much more I need to learn. A sign on my easel encourages me: "Embrace the Struggle." I can never learn it all. I can only hope that the viewer can look at my interpretation of reality and enjoy it. What better occupation could there be?

Most folks think that to be creative you must think outside the box, but that is not the artist's way for **Gerard Del Monte**, fine wood worker. His most recent inspiration is the space *inside* the box. In the past few years, he has been focusing on sculptural art boxes where "I seek to simply surround space as creatively as I can with wood." Those "surrounded spaces" can be elegant, or whimsical, but it is always about the wood and its relationship to space.

Gerard's dad was an avid amateur woodworker, so Gerard grew up surrounded by the enticing smell and feel of wood and the tools to work it. One of his father's friends was a successful industrial designer and Gerard was intrigued by the concepts. This led to Gerard earning a BFA from Rhode Island School of Design, majoring in Industrial Design. Part of the curriculum was furniture design, where Gerard had the good fortune to study under Tage Frid, who later founded Fine Woodworking magazine. This deeply influenced Gerard's drive toward excellence in his creative efforts throughout his life. In 2010 his father passed away and passed on his well-used and well-loved woodworking tools. This coincided with Gerard's enrollment in boat building school in Seattle. When he completed his Associate of Arts degree in Marine Carpentry, he built his own Lincolnville Salmon Wherry sail-and-oar boat using those

familiar tools. He began getting into wood craft more intently and with purpose and started his studio, Aura Atelier.

Gerard's artistic direction is toward the restraint of Zen, and classical mathematical and architectural proportions. He realized that he could best express these with wood. It was the muse for his innate unique creativity. He loved its nearly inexhaustible versatility and its organic variability expressed in different species with their unique grains and workability.

Although art boxes are his current focus, he also designs elegant lighting, housewares and some ephemera. "Right now, I have designed and am making a chess set."

Gerard and his partner, Claudia Mitchell, moved to Sandia Heights in January 2022. They had come in December 2021 to check out the area. They were moving from Langley on Whidbey Island just north of Seattle, and after decades of Pacific Northwest coastal weather were

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looking, in the Monty Python term, "and now for something completely different." "Sandia Heights ticked off the right boxes for us: close to services, but in the foothills of the Sandia Crest with amazing views all around. We really like the whole concept of living with nature—no fences, no street lights, no intrusive powerlines, generous properties with the natural flora left intact."

"We saw signs for the Sandia Heights Artists shortly after we moved here and checked out the studio tour that September and were impressed. We joined right away."

It has worked out well for Gerard and Claudia. He designed a new workshop off the back of the garage, had it built, and is in it every day. Gerard sums it up: "Charles Lloyd, the jazz musician, once put it very simply, 'It's about creating, I have to create.' I subscribe to that."

Old News—A Review of January GRIT Articles Over the Decades Ann List, Resident since 1972

Out of curiosity, I reviewed several January GRIT articles beginning in the 80's. Many addressed the issue of snowy streets in our neighborhood.

1985

For example, this is from January 1985: "The weather has been great for skiers, but not so much for drivers in Sandia Heights. The SHHA pays the Sandia Peak Tram Co. when snow plowing and salting is necessary. They have four plows and one salter. Even when salted, some intersections still become icy and unsafe. The intersections at Live Oak/Tramway Blvd and Tramway Lane/Tramway Blvd are especially dangerous at these times. We suggest the use of alternate routes when icing is a distinct possibility." I know this from personal experience of returning home from work in the city and watching cars slip-slide all over Live Oak Road heading east toward the mountains. Sometimes we'd simply park our cars on the side of the road and walk the rest of the way home (as finding "alternate routes" was totally impossible, unless we followed a snowplow).

1990

The January 1990 GRIT included an article requesting signatures on a petition directed toward City and County officials asking for "the addition, as soon as possible, of a street light, traffic light, and left-turn lanes at the nine main intersections along Tramway Blvd, north of Montgomery."

1995

An item in the January 1995 GRIT began with this: "1994 will be a sad reminder that our remoteness from the City of Albuquerque does not make us immune from crime. We remember the senseless death of Russell Nelson, the Circle K employee brutally murdered on 29 February, and express our thanks to the Circle K Management for limiting hours of operation and through their lighting and surveillance program" (written by Richard Krumbein, SHHA President at the time).

2000

This appeared in the January 2000 GRIT: "The Board was informed that the City and County have plans for Tramway to be an expressway. A motion made and passed unanimously to write a letter to oppose the development of Tramway as an expressway."

2005

The January 2005 edition of the GRIT included this: "In order to correct many of the communication problems we have had for years and to better serve our residents, SHHA has established an office in Sandia Heights."

2010

Then, in January, 2010, with the County having taken over road plowing, weather conditions articles reflected this change. One written by Larry and Frances Desonier (a gal I once knew working in the Special Education Department of Albuquerque Public Schools) stated: "For those new to the neighborhood, this is a

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reminder that our roads are OWNED and MAINTAINED by Bernalillo County. Your home-owners association has absolutely NO authority to do anything about the roads when they are totally iced over." After talking with county officials and learning clearing Sandia Heights roads is at the bottom of their priority list, Larry and Francis suggested, "This being their policy, the best advice is to stay at home the morning after a storm, if at all possible, safe and warm, until ice on the streets begins to melt and it is safe to travel."

2015

Once again, the January 2015 issue of the GRIT reminded us the County is responsible for "removing snow from the public roads." But the article also stated, "There are a few private roads...and if you need help, call the County at 848-1543." (What? Private roads in Sandia Heights? I didn't know they exist, but if anyone knows about them, please inform us all.) There was also an article in the 2015 issue outlining the County's Ordinance regarding animals. But I'll save that for a future issue.

2020

And the January 2020 issue of the GRIT attempted to trace the origin of "The True Grit" back to a Pennsylvania publication in 1882. Wowzo—who knew?!

Expect Changes on San Rafael to Help Slow Down Drivers Kathleen McCaughey, Chair Environment & Safety Committee

The Environment and Safety Committee has been working with BernCO/Public Works to make our streets safer for walking. Resident calls to the SHHA office have been mostly about speeding, with San Rafael receiving the most complaints. Two projects are planned. The first will be a Radar Feedback Trailer, which will be parked along the upper portion of San Rafael. Second, the speed humps on San Rafael will be reconstructed. They are too low, and don't slow down the vehicles as intended. The construction is costly, but BernCo has found the funds for us. This will happen a little slower, I am not sure when this will start, but I will keep you upto-date in the GRIT. Drive Safe! And Slower!
